PARKING PERMITS—WHEN TO GET ONE

Taking your boat out for a short (or long) vacation and need to leave your vehicle on the island for a few days? No problem. Make sure to stop by the marina office to obtain your parking permit, then display it prominently in your front windshield.

To comply with City of Kennewick municipal code tenants may not live on their boats in Clover Island Marina. However, you may enjoy three (3) consecutive overnight stays on your boat in the Clover Island marina with no parking permit required.

BOATER EDUCATION AVAILABLE THROUGH WASHINGTON STATE PARKS



According to Washington State Parks Department, boaters in Washington need to have their Washington State Boater Education Card with them when operating a boat 15 horsepower or greater. Boat operators born before January 1, 1955 are exempt but may choose to get a card if they plan to boat in Canada or Oregon since both require mandatory education. For more information visit:

Frequently Asked Questions

When responding to marina tenant questions some themes are repeated, so from time to time we will present a newsletter Q&A section in an effort to help communicate more broadly.

Question: Washington State's *minimum* insurance requirement for watercraft is \$300,000. Why does the Port require \$1,000,000 in liability insurance for my boat?

Answer: The Port of Kennewick strives to provide a positive boating experience for all and to protect our tenants against any loss of property or bodily injury while on Port property. And that coverage isn't just for your vessel. Damage from fires, explosions, and unforeseen disasters, is not generally limited to a single boat—oftentimes such incidents destroy adjacent docks and neighboring vessels. This requirement is in place to benefit both you and the port, and to help provide our tenants with peace of mind, knowing that their neighbors are also insured at fiscally responsible level.
