

ACTION ITEMS

A. Gunderson Rail Services LLC dba Greenbrier Rail Services Tenant Improvement Request – Asphalt Project

Ms. Hanchette stated the Port received a request from Greenbrier Rail Services requesting permission to pave the driveway and parking lot at 228919 E Cochran Road, with approximately 71,000 square feet of asphalt. For Commission consideration is Resolution 2025-14, approving Greenbrier Rail's asphalt project, in which they will construct and maintain improvements as outlined in original lease.

Commissioner Moak requested before and after photos of projects regarding tenant made improvements and thinks what Greenbrier Rail is doing for the area is great.

A. Vista Field

Mr. Arntzen stated at this time there is nothing to report regarding the potential PFAS at a private lot at Vista Field. Mr. Arntzen stated the private samples that were taken in June were at very low levels, and two of the three samples were estimated levels. With that in mind, the Port has contracted with Landau Associates, who specialize in environmental sampling. Landau will field check the samples done by the private party and then take additional samples around Phase 1 and other areas of Vista Field. Mr. Arntzen stated testing will begin the week of August 18, 2025, and it will take time to interpret the raw data once the samples are pulled. Mr. Arntzen and staff will continue to share any new information with the Commission, the public, and the media.

Commissioner Hohenberg stated the communication plan created by the staff has been excellent regarding this issue.

Commissioner Novakovich inquired if there were any acceptable level of PFAS.

Mr. Arntzen stated we have found some inconsistencies as we move forward with this process and part of it is that it is very identifying PFAS is a very new scenario for the state and federal regulators.

B. Kennewick Waterfront Update

1. National Lighthouse Day - August 7, 2025

Ms. Bader Inglima stated August 7th is National Lighthouse Day and KNDU News broadcasted a live feed on Thursday at 4:30 a.m. with a series of four segments showcasing the island and its artwork. Ms. Bader Inglima reported that the Clover Island Lighthouse is part of the passport stamp program, and lighthouse enthusiasts can obtain the official stamp at the Clover Island Inn or Ice Harbor Brewery at the Marina (*Exhibit B*).

2. Event Review

Mr. Phongsa gave a brief presentation on the summer events scheduled at Columbia Gardens (*Exhibit C*).

C. 2024 SAO Accountability and Financial Audit

Commissioner Novakovich congratulated the Port team for 30 years of clean audits.

Mr. Kooiker reported on the recent 2024 State Auditor's Office Accountability and Financial audit and state the audit was done completely remote and lasted three months.

D. CEO Report

Mr. Arntzen reported on the following:

• He met with the environmental team regarding Vista Field PFAS to discuss prevailing wage. It was determined that most of the testing is not subject to prevailing wage.

- Mr. Arntzen attended the Clover Island Inn Concert series last Wednesday. The new ownership group hired Emerald Spark to facilitate and book the summer concert series and approximately 250 people attended the free concert. Mr. Arntzen stated Blue Tattoo, a band out of Pendleton performed and even made comments about the new stage.
- Mr. Blotz was instrumental in bringing the Port and the CTUIR together several years ago and he passed on Don Sampson's new contact information to Mr. Arntzen. Mr. Arntzen reached out to Mr. Sampson, who was pleased to hear from him, and Mr. Sampson will be participating in the update to the CTUIR history section of the comprehensive scheme.

Commissioner Moak asked Mr. Arntzen if it felt like the concert series was a continuation of the previous years.

Mr. Arntzen believes it was a seamless transition and stated Mr. Blotz did a great job pioneering the concert series.

F. Non-Scheduled Items

Ms. Bader Inglima worked in partnership with the City of Kennewick to replace an old gateway sign with new wayfinding signage for Clover Island (*Exhibit D*).

Ms. Hanchette congratulated Victor Palencia and Monarcha Winery on being voted the top winery in the Tri-Cities by *Tri City Herald* readers. Ms. Hanchette stated the Port is very proud of Mr. Palencia and all of his hard work.

Mr. Boehnke reported the wood portion of the walking path near the Gathering Place was replaced due to water rot. It was replaced with colored, stamped concrete that matches the Causeway path. Additionally, staff inspected the Gathering Place decking, and it remains solid.
